

Street Pride and Community Groups

January was a busy month for Whittlesey Street Pride.

The group kicked off the New Year with a litter pick on New Year's Day where 15 members attended.

Environmental Health

Officers are involved in responding to complaints at the Saxon Pit site in Whittlesey. Complaints of Odour and noise have bene received and a monitoring plan has been put in place. Much of the activity on site is regulated by the County Council or Environment Agency however the council must investigate complaints and refer their findings to the agencies.

Tidy Fenland - Green Dog Walkers

With the short days still with us, patrols to target the most notorious areas have been increased, to deal with the increase of dog fouling reports. This increase follows on from the holiday season. The main areas being, Highcause Way, Arnolds Lane, Coronation Ave, Park Lane, Riverside Close and Thornham Way Eastrea. We have also begun monitoring the cemetery following reports people are ignoring the PSPO in place which bans dogs.

Tidy Fenland - Fly Tipping

The recorded incidents of fly tipping are shown below for Whittlesey and the villages that had fly tipping this month. We attended the 10 incidents in Whittlesey during January. Sadly, despite searching amongst the waste there was leads to follow up. Signage has been renewed in key areas to reduce the amount of waste being deposited in these locations. We are now also working with our more rural residents in relation to providing them with information on reporting incidents and what to look out for.

Fly Tipping found in the main was household related and a mixture of black bags and bulky items.

2 outstanding Fixed Penalty Notices issued for Duty of Care offences (where a householder has failed to check who they gave their waste too, ultimately leading to it being fly tipped in Whittlesey) have now been paid.

Open Spaces

Hedges are the focus of the latter part of the year and the team have been diligently working their way across the district in November and December. All hedges were completed before Christmas.

A donation by the Japanese government to the MP of a quantity of cherry trees was received by Whittlesey TC and these were duly planted across 6 locations in the area -Snowley Park, Pondersbridge Village Hall, Thornham Play area (Eastrea), Grounds Way (Coates), Cherry Tree Grove, St Mary's Church. The specimens are 3 metre tall (growing to 5 metre in time) and will provide some lovely colour to the areas. Appreciation goes to Cllr Mayor for her co-ordinating of the project.

The seeding of the wildflower at Manor Field (6,000 sq. m.) has proceeded as planned to date with much positive feedback. Success in this area will precipitate further initiatives across the district.

Another 30 trees have been planted in Whittlesey Cemetery and these supplement those that have prospered following planting last Autumn.

The successful contractor (same as Snowley Park) was duly appointed to undertake the extension to the play area at Burdett Grove and work will commence in April 2022 on a 3-4 week programme worth £45k. We have marked 3 budal plots this month.
