Antisocial behaviour (ASB) - identifying and reporting

In our National Crime and Community Survey 2023, respondents told us that antisocial behaviour (ASB) has been the most experienced, and the most feared, crime, over the previous 12 months. Although The Office for National Statistics (ONS) reported that crime rates dropped by 10% in 2023, our survey found that a staggering 37% of Brits experienced a crime in the last year, with 63% of those having experienced antisocial behaviour, followed by physical assault (25%).

This month, we'll be sharing guidance on identifying ASB, as well as how to report it. We'll also be focusing on fly-tipping as a form of ASB which affects communities across England and Wales, and how you can safely and responsibly dispose of waste, as well as how to report incidents of fly-tipping.

Recognise

Recognising what ASB is and isn't, can be difficult. What constitutes ASB is extremely subjective and whilst we have examples of behaviour, what you may consider to be antisocial behaviour, another person may not. Noise nuisance; neighbour and household disputes; harassment and intimidation; vandalism; and littering are all examples of ASB. There's a fine line between antisocial behaviour and neighbour disputes which can often begin over relatively minor inconveniences, such as parking. However, if they persist, they can potentially become antisocial behaviour. <u>Read more on our website</u>.

Record

It is important to keep a record of the antisocial behaviour incidents, as this will be of great help in investigating the behaviour and tackling it. It can also help you to get some perspective on how often the incidents take place. If you decide to take formal action at some stage, it can help others see an established pattern of nuisance over time. You can <u>use</u> <u>our ASB diary to record incidents</u> before reporting them.

Report

Antisocial behaviour can ruin lives and devastate communities. Reporting antisocial behaviour early on is important to prevent it from escalating. The Local Authority, Social Housing Landlords & the police all have powers to deal with antisocial behaviour. It is important that on reporting antisocial behaviour to your local authority, police or housing provider that you detail the impact that it is having on your health and wellbeing.

PM Rishi Sunak visits Horsham NW group

Sussex Neighbourhood Watch were invited to an informal meeting with their Horsham colleagues and the Sussex Police & Crime Commissioner, Katy Bourne OBE, at a local pub in June, and were surprised to be joined by Prime Minister Rishi Sunak.

Mr Sunak was campaigning in West Sussex, and had visited Crawley earlier in the day. This followed an announcement that a further 8,000 warranted police officers were to be recruited, and a hotspot policing programme introduced to stamp out antisocial behaviour across England and Wales.

Mr Sunak was keen to hear about how Neighbourhood Watch was helping to enhance crime prevention in Sussex, with John Wright MBE, the Chair of Sussex Neighbourhood Watch Federation, explaining how the 100,000+ members of Neighbourhood Watch across the county support Sussex Police to help keep residents and visitors as safe as possible. Mr Sunak was surprised at the size and reach of Neighbourhood Watch, and its range of activities in Sussex.

John said: "Katy Bourne has been very supportive of Neighbourhood Watch, and has provided much needed funding for a range of projects planned for the coming months."

He continued: "Neighbourhood Watch is a charity, and as such we are completely neutral in politics. Our focus is on crime prevention, reducing the fear of crime, public and community safety, and Community Resilience. We want people to feel safe as well as to be safe."


